A Letter from Father O'Donohue

Dear Parents, Students, and all Members of our Holy Spirit School community,

It has been three weeks since I last saw most of you. None of us began this school year with any idea that we would be finishing it this way. I've heard Mrs. Ashby say, "I must have missed that day in college when they taught us how to principal and teach in a time of pandemic." I think this applies to how to parent, how to pastor, etc. as well. Yet here we are, three weeks into this new regimen.

I cannot exaggerate how impressed I have been by our faculty's and staff's swift changeover from us being a brick and mortar school to becoming a "virtual school." I know the stresses and demands of this on all involved (teachers, parents, students) has been unavoidably intense. Yet we are called by God and by our responsibility to each other to do the best we can, and you are doing that.
